Blue Mountains Pride takes place on the traditional the lands of the Dharug and Gundungurra people. We pay our respects to their elders past and present.

Pride

Blue Mountains Pride is one of many Pride festivals around the world. June is Pride month, commemorating the Stonewall Riot in June 1969 in New York City, and, in Australia, the first Mardi Gras in June 1978.



In the early hours of 28 June 1969 the police raided the Stonewall Inn in Greenwich Village, New York, a regular occurrence. Rather than line up and allow the police to verify the sex of the female patrons, arresting any trans women or drag queens, the patrons resisted the police. The community had had enough of the raids and arrests. A crowd quickly gathered, and violence broke out. Garbage cans, bottles and rocks were thrown. Fires were started. It escalated to a full-scale riot with more police arriving. (Wikipedia)

On 24 June 1978 the Gay Solidarity Group organised a parade after a day of solidarity activities in Sydney. A small crowd with a sound system on a flat-bed truck gathered in Taylor Square, some wearing fun outfits. They proceeded down Oxford Street with lesbians and gay men from the bars joining in. They were headed to Hyde Park. At College Street the police confiscated the truck. The crowd was diverted and headed to the Cross. Once there they started to disperse, but the police had blocked off Darlinghurst Road and started arresting people. Again, it turned into a riot with 53 people arrested. (78ers)

Pride is our response to the long oppression of LGBTQIA+ people, galvanised by such events. Rather than shamefully hiding our sexuality and gender identity from the world, we take pride in being ourselves. We celebrate our Pride in public displays such as the Sydney Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras Parade. We make ourselves visible to promote awareness and acceptance.

In Australia we have fought for and obtained many rights since the riots. Laws making gay sex illegal were repealed in NSW in 1984, and eventually in Tasmania in 1997 after a complaint to the United Nations. Anti-discrimination laws were progressively passed in the states, and federally in 2013. Federal laws recognising same sex relationships were passed in 2009, and full marriage equality in 2017 after a postal survey. This was despite the Howard government in 2004 amending the law to only allow marriage between a man and a woman. (Wikipedia)

Rights for transgender people in Australia are more recent, allowing drivers licenses and passports to be amended to reflect gender identity. Non-binary genders are being allowed on official documents. Medical treatment can be difficult to obtain. We still have a long way to go.

Homosexuality is illegal in many parts of the world, with 6 countries imposing the death penalty. Recent changes in USA have revoked many rights, especially for trans people. Culture wars around the world are making it more difficult for LGBTQIA+ people. (Wikipedia)

Blue Mountains Pride builds on this foundation and celebrates how far we have come, while reflecting on those places that are not as fortunate as Australia. We honour the sacrifices of those who fought for our rights, and create a safe place for people to discover their authentic selves.



IDAHOBIT

Blue Mountains City Council will raise the Progress Pride flag and hold a free community event to celebrate the International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia, Interphobia and Transphobia (IDAHOBIT) on Saturday 17 May.

The event will be held from 10am to 12pm in the Tibbi Whalan Hall, Katoomba Civic Centre, with speeches from Blue Mountains Mayor Cr Mark Greenhill and members of the Blue Mountains LGBTQIA+ community, stalls, morning tea and a chill out space.

IDAHOBIT is celebrated internationally on 17 May, the anniversary of the World Health Organisation removing homosexuality from the International Classification of Diseases in 1990.

Blue Mountains City Council is one of the few Australian councils committed to flying the Pride flag annually on 17 May in support of IDAHOBIT and the LGBTQIA+ community more broadly.

Blue Mountains Mayor Mark Greenhill said, "Flying the flag sends a strong message of the value and respect the Blue Mountains holds LGBTQIA+ residents and visitors in, and reinforces we will never tolerate acts of discrimination, hatred or intimidation in our community.

"The theme for IDAHOBIT 2025 is 'The Power of Communities'. Community is one of the most valuable things we experience in life. Strong communities make us feel safe and included and creating vibrant community has immense social and cultural benefits for us all."

GLBTQ+ Bushwalk

Bush

10am Saturday 7 June



Join us for this bushwalk as part of the Kings Birthday weekend festivities!

Hosted by Bush Lemons. <u>All welcome</u> (including dogs on leads)!

We will walk the old fire trails and tracks at **Ngula Bulgarabang Regional Park**, just outside Katoomba, and end up at the Megalong Head Lookout for morning tea, with it's beautiful views over the Megalong Valley. The fire trails make this easy walking and there is a short but fairly easy walk down a single file track to the lookout. All up the walk will be about 6km.

This area was bought from private ownership by the State Government in 2019 and the regional park was created to keep it safe for the animals and plants, walkers, rock climbers and explorers. It is the last remaining undeveloped peninsula-plateau in the upper Blue Mountains. It has a huge variety of flora and fauna, tall eucalypt forests, significant Aboriginal heritage, as well as the beautiful views.

Meet: 10am on Saturday, 7 June, at the locked gate at the end of Pulpit Hill Road (turn off the highway at the Explorers Tree).

Bring: Some drinking water, a snack for morning tea, appropriate footwear. And please, wear your rainbow finery! Scarves, feather boas, shimmery shorts etc!!








Blue Mountains Pride

Blue Mountains Pride was formed in 2024 to coordinate the activities of the LGBTQIA+ groups in the NSW Blue Mountains over the King's Birthday long weekend. Since this coincides with Pride Month and Pride festivals around the world, we felt it was the perfect name for the group.



The community groups that form Blue Mountains Pride are bentART, Bush Lemons, Blue Mountains IDAHOBIT, PFLAG Blue Mountains, Three Sisters Social Group and Trans and Gender Diverse Blue Mountains. Activities are run by the individual groups.

There has been a long history of LGBTQIA+ groups and activities in the Blue Mountains.

The Mountaineers held their first Black and White Ball in 1981 at Springwood. More than 40 Balls were held over the years organised by The Mountaineers, then GAGS (Garden and Gourmet Society) and Three Sisters Social Group. The Soirée is the successor to Ball and is the place to be on the Sunday night.

bentART celebrates 20 years this year. Starting in 2005 its annual exhibitions was held in the Katoomba Leura Community Centre. It then moved to Wentworth Falls

School of Arts, where the launch on the Friday night became a major event in itself. It has since moved back to the heart of Katoomba at the Rex-Livingstone Art+Objects Gallery. The smaller space limits the numbers who are able to attend the launch. Over the years it has featured hundreds of queer artists from the Blue Mountains and around Australia.

Bush Lemons started their bushwalks in 1996 with a walk most weekends. While the group usually is for women, the bushwalk on the long weekend is a fun and inclusive event where people are invited to dress in rainbow finery. All GLBTQ+ are welcome.

In 1991 the AIDS Memorial Project created a living memorial for many of the 250 people of the Blue Mountains community who succumbed to AIDS. It was created in Medlow Bath. Three Sisters Social Group has become the custodian of the memorial. After many years of neglect the memorial was reimagined and revitalized. It was dedicated in December 2022.
